Celebrating Success:

SARB Collaborative Website Wins National Award

The Santa Ana River Bottom (SARB) Collaborative Website received the National Association of Counties (NACo) Best in Category Award for Information Technology. This achievement highlighted the innovative efforts of the RivCoParks SARB Unit in leveraging Geographic Information System (GIS) technology to enhance homeless outreach while protecting the natural resources of the Santa Ana River Bottom.

The SARB Collaborative Website, developed by the Riverside County Information Technology Department, provided critical real-time data to support homeless outreach initiatives. Using GIS technology, the website allowed for precise mapping and monitoring of homeless encampments, equipping teams with the tools to track locations, sizes, and conditions of encampments effectively. This data proved vital in allocating resources, coordinating interventions, and addressing both immediate and long-term needs in the community.

The platform fostered collaboration across departments and partner organizations by offering a unified space for sharing data. This streamlined approach strengthened coordination among outreach providers and improved service delivery to unsheltered individuals, offering support such as shelter, medical care, and social services. The ability to analyze trends and patterns also informed policy decisions and strategic planning, ensuring that efforts were both responsive and sustainable.

The SARB Unit's commitment to innovation and teamwork stood out as a model for addressing complex challenges. The website exemplified how sharing resources and knowledge among partners could maximize services and improve outcomes for the community. The award not only recognized the functionality of the website but also validated the dedication of everyone involved in the collaborative effort.

This recognition by NACo highlights the importance of leveraging technology to drive meaningful change and serve the community more effectively. It also inspired the department to continue exploring innovative solutions that enhance both the environment and the lives of Riverside County residents. Bridging the Nature Gap:

RivCoParks Outdoor Equity Initiative

Accessing nature and outdoor recreation is part of our RivCoParks family everyday lives, but for underserved communities in Riverside County, systemic disparities have created a significant "Nature Gap." Economic challenges, limited resources, and historical inequities have restricted access to

parks and green spaces, particularly for children, youth, and racial and ethnic minorities. Adding to these barriers, inadequate transportation options and a lack of targeted programming have made it difficult for residents in underserved areas to enjoy the benefits of nature.

RivCoParks has taken an ambitious step forward to address these disparities through the Outdoor Equity Initiative. This program directly focuses on increasing access to parks and open spaces for low-income communities and local veterans. By removing financial and logistical barriers, the initiative ensures that all residents, regardless of background, can experience the physical, mental, and emotional benefits of outdoor recreation.

Free and reduced-cost programs are at the heart of this effort, including fishing clinics, summer camps, and special events designed to engage participants with meaningful outdoor experiences. These activities not only promote personal well-being but also strengthen community bonds and inspire a lifelong connection to nature.

The initiative goes beyond recreation. It emphasizes education about conservation, environmental stewardship, and the cultural and historical significance of RivCoParks' spaces. By combining these elements, RivCoParks empowers participants to develop a deeper appreciation for the environment while fostering inclusive spaces that celebrate Riverside County's natural and cultural heritage.

Funding such a vital initiative has presented challenges, but with the support of elected officials and local business

sponsorships, RivCoParks is well-positioned to sustain and grow this impactful program. This collaborative approach reflects a shared commitment to breaking down systemic barriers and ensuring that outdoor spaces are welcoming and accessible for everyone in our community.

The Outdoor Equity Initiative exemplifies RivCoParks' dedication to equity, accessibility, and diversity in all its efforts. Together, we are working to create opportunities for all residents to experience the transformative power of nature—because everyone deserves to explore, enjoy, and connect with the great outdoors.

1. Lake Skinner Sewer/Water (PK-ARPA003)

Construction on the water valve/backflow replacements began on January 6, 2025.

2. Lake Skinner Repaying Projects (PK-ARPA004)

Construction will began on January 6, 2025.

3. Rancho Jurupa Paving (PK-ARPA005)

Construction began on January 6, 2025.

4. OHV Feasibility Study (PK-ARPA006)

Contractor KTUA completed site visits and are drafting the opportunities and constraints report. The development of the OHV website and conceptual designs are also being drafted.

5. RivCoParks Tourism Project (PK-ARPA007)

The remaining \$27,905 funds will be used to subsidize school field trips at Nature Centers and Historic Sites.

6. D4 Feasibility Study (PK-ARPA008)

Contractor-Webb Associates has completed the Draft Opportunities and Constraints Report and Community outreach concluded on December 14, 2024. Webb is now preparing the economic analysis and Final Report.

7. Santa Ana River Bottom (SARB) Yard (PK-ARPA009)

Rough grading on the bldg. pad and the entry service road has been completed. Perimeter CMU walls footing have started, and the re-bar is being put in place.

8. Santa Ana River Trail Wayfinding (SART) (PK-ARPA010)

Manufacturing of the signs are underway with an estimated installation date January 13, 2024.

9. Lake Skinner Boat Launch Repair (PK-ARPA011)

Construction began on January 8, 2025.

10. Santa Rosa Plateau Broadband Project (PK-ARPA012)

Project complete.

11. Lawlor Lodge ADA Improvements (PK-ARPA013)

Contractor will begin hazardous material abatement and demolition.

12. Kabian Memorial Park Improvements (PK-ARPA014):

Demolition of the existing restrooms and trenching for the electrical and water lines has been completed. Over-excavating for the new restrooms has also been completed.

13. Lake Cahuilla Paving Project (PK-ARPA015)

Project complete.

14. Lake Cahuilla Amenities Update (PK-ARPA015)

Contractor KYA Services Inc. has mobilized and began demolition and grading work on January 6, 2025.

15. Lake Cahuilla Master Plan (PK-ARPA015)

Initial site visits have been completed by Webb Associates and their subconsultants. The amenities and trails analysis are underway.

16. Hidden Valley Nature Center (PK-ARPA016):

Contractor has mobilized and demo work has begun.

17. Hurkey Creek Park Beatification (PK-ARPA017):

Job Order Contract (JOC) in place and construction projected to begin winter of 2025.

A Fun Story!

Did you know that determining a snake's gender isn't easy without a vet or expert? It often requires a physical exam, but you can make an educated guess based on the shape of their tail. Since Ziggy was donated, she had always been referred to as male. That is, until May 2023, when eggs were discovered in her enclosure! (The eggs were not viable since she has never shared her space with a mate.)



Facts About California Kingsnakes

- Classification: California Kingsnakes are one of seven subspecies of the Common Kingsnake. The others include Eastern, Florida, Speckled, Black, Mexican, and Desert Kingsnakes.
- Size and Appearance: They can range from 36 to 82 inches long and have chocolate-brown to black skin with bold pale or yellowish crossbands.
- Habitat: These snakes are found throughout California, including Santa Catalina Island. They thrive in various environments, from forests to deserts, but avoid high elevations like the Sierra Nevada mountains. They are most abundant near streams and rivers.
- **Diet:** Kingsnakes are opportunistic feeders and eat lizards, rodents, birds, and even other snakes, including rattlesnakes! They possess special enzymes and antibodies that make them immune to snake venom.
- **Defensive Behaviors:** When threatened, California Kingsnakes may hiss, rattle their tail, roll into a ball, or release a foul-smelling musk from their postanal glands.
- Predators: Their natural predators include large mammals, birds of prey, and other snakes.

The event began with the coaches ceremoniously adding their sticker to our trail sign. In addition to surveying the Coyote Trail, they also agreed to help work on a portion of the education area near the Hidden Valley Nature Center. Ramon Barrera, Park Maintenance Worker, chose 3 volunteers from the group to help cut back overgrowth. Janae Pulido, Volunteer Services Coordinator, walked about a mile of the Coyote Trail with the rest of the group. They used gloves and trash pickers to clear litter and debris along the way. Later in the day, the two teams met up with and divided into 3 groups. The 1st group continued to cut overgrowth, the 2nd group used rakes, mcleods, shovels and pitch forks to clear trimmed foliage, and the 3rd group surveyed the staging area for more trash and debris.

CBU's athletes have previously used the Coyote Trail for training, and they can now take pride in the work they've done to keep it clean for wildlife and other visitors. We appreciate their hard work, and we look forward to our ongoing partnership.

IT Security Reminder for Park District Staff

Keeping our Park District's digital systems safe is everyone's responsibility. Here are some simple steps you can take to help protect our sensitive information:

1. Password Safety:

- Change your passwords regularly (every 3-6 months).
- Use strong, unique passwords for each account.
- Avoid using personal information in passwords.
- Consider using a password manager for better security.

2. Email Safety:

- ✓ Be cautious of unexpected emails, especially those asking for personal information.
- ➤ Don't click on links or download attachments from unknown senders.
- ✓ When in doubt, contact the IT department.

3. Computer Safety:

- Lock your computer when you step away from your desk.
- Keep your software and operating system up-to-date.
- ➤ Don't install unauthorized software on work devices.

4. Physical Security:

- ✓ Keep sensitive documents secure and out of sight.
- X Don't leave work devices unattended in public places.
- Report any lost or stolen devices immediately.

5. Public Wi-Fi Safety:

X Avoid accessing sensitive work information on public Wi-Fi networks.

6. Data Handling:

- ✓ Only access and share sensitive information when necessary.
- ✓ Double-check email recipients before sending sensitive data.
- ✓ Properly dispose of documents containing sensitive information.

Remember, cybersecurity is an ongoing process.

Stay alert and report any suspicious activities to the IT department.
